## John 3:9 – 22

New American Standard Version

1 Nicodemus said to Him, How can these things 2 be? Jesus answered and said to him, Are you 3 the teacher of Israel and do not understand these things? Truly, truly, I say to you, we 4 5 speak of what we know and testify of what we have seen, and you do not accept our 6 testimony. If I told you earthly things and 7 you do not believe, how will you believe if I 8 tell you heavenly things? No one has 9 10 ascended into heaven, but He who descended from heaven: the Son of Man. As Moses 11 12 lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up; so that 13 whoever believes will in Him have eternal life. 14 For God so loved the world, that He gave His 15 16 only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life. 17 For God did not send the Son into the world 18 to judge the world, but that the world might 19 be saved through Him. He who believes in 20 Him is not judged; he who does not believe 21 has been judged already, because he has not 22 23 believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God. This is the judgment, that the 24 Light has come into the world, and men loved 25 the darkness rather than the Light, for their 26 deeds were evil. For everyone who does evil 27 hates the Light, and does not come to the 28 Light for fear that his deeds will be exposed. 29 But he who practices the truth comes to the 30 Light, so that his deeds may be manifested 31 as having been wrought in God. After these 32 things Jesus and His disciples came into the 33 34 land of Judea, and there He was spending time with them and baptizing. 35
