Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 1:29 – 2:13

²⁹ so that no man may boast before God.³⁰ But by His doing 1 2 you are in Christ Jesus, who became to us wisdom from God, and righteousness and sanctification, and redemption, 3 ³¹ so that, just as it is written, "LET HIM WHO BOASTS, BOAST 4 IN THE LORD." ^{2:1} And when I came to you, brethren, I did 5 not come with superiority of speech or of wisdom, 6 7 proclaiming to you the testimony of God. ² For I determined 8 to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and Him 9 crucified.³ I was with you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling, ⁴ and my message and my preaching were 10 not in persuasive words of wisdom, but in demonstration of 11 12 the Spirit and of power, ⁵ so that your faith would not rest on the wisdom of men, but on the power of God. ⁶ Yet we do 13 speak wisdom among those who are mature; a wisdom, 14 15 however, not of this age nor of the rulers of this age, who are passing away; ⁷ but we speak God's wisdom in a 16 mystery, the hidden *wisdom* which God predestined before 17 the ages to our glory; ⁸ the wisdom which none of the rulers 18 19 of this age has understood; for if they had understood it they 20 would not have crucified the Lord of glory; ⁹ but just as it is written, "THINGS WHICH EYE HAS NOT SEEN AND EAR HAS 21 22 NOT HEARD, AND which HAVE NOT ENTERED THE HEART OF 23 MAN, ALL THAT GOD HAS PREPARED FOR THOSE WHO LOVE HIM." ¹⁰ For to us God revealed *them* through the Spirit; for 24 the Spirit searches all things, even the depths of God. ¹¹For 25 26 who among men knows the *thoughts* of a man except the spirit of the man which is in him? Even so the *thoughts* of 27 God no one knows except the Spirit of God. ¹² Now we have 28 29 received, not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit who is 30 from God, so that we may know the things freely given to us by God, ¹³ which things we also speak, not in words 31 taught by human wisdom, but in those taught by the Spirit, 32 33 combining spiritual thoughts with spiritual words.

- Is there an example to follow?
