¹⁸Let no man deceive himself. If any man among you thinks 1 that he is wise in this age, he must become foolish, so that 2 he may become wise. ¹⁹ For the wisdom of this world is 3 foolishness before God. For it is written, "He is THE ONE 4 WHO CATCHES THE WISE IN THEIR CRAFTINESS"; ²⁰ and again, 5 "THE LORD KNOWS THE REASONINGS of the wise, THAT THEY 6 ARE USELESS." ²¹ So then let no one boast in men. For all 7 things belong to you, ²² whether Paul or Apollos or Cephas 8 9 or the world or life or death or things present or things to come; all things belong to you, ²³ and you belong to Christ; 10 and Christ belongs to God. ^{4:1} Let a man regard us in this 11 12 manner, as servants of Christ and stewards of the mysteries 13 of God.² In this case, moreover, it is required of stewards that one be found trustworthy. ³ But to me it is a very small 14 15 thing that I may be examined by you, or by *any* human 16 court; in fact, I do not even examine myself. ⁴ For I am 17 conscious of nothing against myself, yet I am not by this acquitted; but the one who examines me is the Lord. 18 19 ⁵ Therefore do not go on passing judgment before the time, 20 but wait until the Lord comes who will both bring to light 21 the things hidden in the darkness and disclose the motives of 22 men's hearts; and then each man's praise will come to him 23 from God. ⁶Now these things, brethren, I have figuratively 24 applied to myself and Apollos for your sakes, so that in us 25 you may learn not to exceed what is written, so that no one 26 of you will become arrogant in behalf of one against the 27 other. ⁷ For who regards you as superior? What do you have 28 that you did not receive? And if you did receive it, why do 29 you boast as if you had not received it?

Use the suggestions on the back page as a starting point for your own **Observation**, **Interpretation**, and **Application**.

Observation (What does it say?):

Underline what Paul wants them to do (or not do) as a result of this part of his letter.

Circle what he says about judging or evaluating.

Interpretation (What does it mean?):

What is the boasting in men that Paul warns against? (line 7)

What does "belong" mean (lines 7-11)? ESV and NIV have "All things are yours", etc. In v. 23 NIV has "You are of Christ, Christ is of God." What was Paul's point? How does it relate to wisdom and boasting in men?

What kind of judgment or examination is Paul describing? Why does he consider it a "very small thing" (l. 14-15)? Shouldn't we listen to others speaking into our lives?

Application (What does it mean for me?):

What might "boasting in men" look like today? Where would it be a potential problem in your life?

How do you react when others judge or examine your life or your actions? When should you listen, and when should you consider it a "very small thing"?

(A few general ideas)

Observation (What does it <u>say</u>?) What <u>facts</u> do you observe about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?

Interpretation (What does it <u>mean</u>?) What <u>questions</u> come to mind about the facts that would help you **interpret** the meaning?

- How would the original readers have understood the passage?
- What is the main emphasis?
- Why does the writer use repetition, or contrast, or unusual words?
- What does the grammar or structure of the passage reveal about the writer's thought pattern?
- Is there a logical sequence in the passage?
- How are different ideas in the passage connected?
- Are there any new ideas or concepts presented?
- Are there difficulties in the passage?

Application (What does it mean for me?) What is the <u>impact</u> on your life? What **application** does the Holy Spirit want to show you?

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to be thankful for?
- Is there an attribute of God to worship?
- Is there an example to follow?
