What does He mean by "My joy" and "your joy made full"? What is your experience of the fullness of the joy of Jesus? How have you seen that related to the themes in this passage?

Questions for further thought and discussion:

- What does "pruning" (v. 2) mean? Why do you think Jesus didn't explain that image in more detail?
- What is "fruit" in this passage? Converts? Character development? Good works? Other things? What characterizes fruit that makes it so important in Jesus' teaching in this passage?
- How do you understand the branches that are burned (v. 6)? Are these different from the branches that are "taken away" (v. 2)? Is that an unfruitful Christian life, or the punishment of unbelievers? Or is that image a minor part of the picture Jesus is giving, not intended for in-depth interpretation? Sometimes we tend to read too much into the details of parables. Is this one of those times?
- How does keeping commands represent friendship (v. 14) rather than slavery (v. 15)?

Inductive Bible Study (A few general ideas)

Interpretation (What does it mean?) What questions come to mind

about the facts that would help you **interpret** the meaning?

- How would the original readers have understood the passage?
- What is the main emphasis?
- Why does the writer use repetition, or contrast, or unusual words?
- What does the grammar or structure of the passage reveal about the writer's thought pattern?
- Is there a logical sequence in the passage?
- How are different ideas in the passage connected?
- Are there any new ideas or concepts presented?
- Are there difficulties in the passage?

Application (What doe's it mean for me?) What is the impact on your life? What application does the Holy Spirit want to show you?

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to be thankful for?
- Is there an attribute of God to worship?
- Is there an example to follow?

Observation (What does it say?)

What facts do you observe about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?
