²⁰ Remember the word that I said to you, 'A slave is not 1 2 greater than his master.' If they persecuted Me, they will also persecute you; if they kept My word, they will keep 3 yours also. ²¹ But all these things they will do to you for My name's sake, because they do not know the One who sent 5 Me. ²² If I had not come and spoken to them, they would not 6 have sin, but now they have no excuse for their sin. ²³ He who hates Me hates My Father also. ²⁴ If I had not done 8 among them the works which no one else did, they would 9 not have sin; but now they have both seen and hated Me and 10 My Father as well. ²⁵ But they have done this to fulfill the 11 12 word that is written in their Law, 'THEY HATED ME WITHOUT A CAUSE.' ²⁶ When the Helper comes, whom I will 13 14 send to you from the Father, that is the Spirit of truth who proceeds from the Father, He will testify about Me, ²⁷ and 15 you will testify also, because you have been with Me from 16 the beginning. ^{16:1} These things I have spoken to you so that 17 you may be kept from stumbling. ² They will make you 18 19 outcasts from the synagogue, but an hour is coming for 20 everyone who kills you to think that he is offering service to 21 God. ³ These things they will do because they have not known the Father or Me.⁴ But these things I have spoken to 22 23 you, so that when their hour comes, you may remember that 24 I told you of them. These things I did not say to you at the 25 beginning, because I was with you. ⁵ But now I am going to Him who sent Me; and none of you asks Me, 'Where are 26 You going?' ⁶ But because I have said these things to you, 27 28 sorrow has filled your heart. ⁷ But I tell you the truth, it is to 29 your advantage that I go away; for if I do not go away, the Helper will not come to you; but if I go, I will send Him to 30 you. 8 And He, when He comes, will convict the world 31 concerning sin and righteousness and judgment; oncerning 32 sin, because they do not believe in Me; 10 and concerning 33 34 righteousness, because I go to the Father and you no longer 35 see Me; ¹¹ and concerning judgment, because the ruler of 36 this world has been judged.

Application (What does it mean for me?):

How might this passage affect the way you relate to the Triune God – Father, Son, and Spirit?

What does it mean to have a unique relationship with each person of the Trinity?

How does our relationship with each person of the Trinity relate to how we face troubles (the topic Jesus started with in this passage)?

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Questions for further thought and discussion:

- "None of you asks Me, 'Where are you going" (v. 5). What about Peter's question in 13:36? What about Thomas' comment and question in 14:5? Hadn't the disciples asked Him that question? What do you make of Jesus statement?
- How does the motive of serving God relate to knowing the Trinity (v. 2-3)?
- "If I had not..." (v. 22-24). What does Jesus mean, "...they would not have sin"? Does lack of hearing Jesus' words or seeing His deeds remove accountability for sin?

Observation (What does it sav?)

What <u>facts</u> do you **observe** about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?
