²¹ You cannot drink the cup of the Lord and the cup of 1 2 demons; you cannot partake of the table of the Lord and the table of demons. ²² Or do we provoke the Lord to jealousy? 3 We are not stronger than He, are we? ²³ All things are 4 5 lawful, but not all things are profitable. All things are 6 lawful, but not all things edify. ²⁴ Let no one seek his own 7 good, but that of his neighbor. ²⁵ Eat anything that is sold in the meat market without asking questions for conscience' 8 sake; ²⁶ FOR THE EARTH IS THE LORD'S, AND ALL IT 9 CONTAINS. ²⁷ If one of the unbelievers invites you and you 10 11 want to go, eat anything that is set before you without asking questions for conscience' sake. ²⁸ But if anyone says 12 to you, "This is meat sacrificed to idols," do not eat it, for 13 the sake of the one who informed you, and for conscience' 14 sake; ²⁹ I mean not your own conscience, but the other 15 man's; for why is my freedom judged by another's 16 conscience? ³⁰ If I partake with thankfulness, why am I 17 slandered concerning that for which I give thanks? 18 ³¹ Whether, then, you eat or drink or whatever you do, do all 19 to the glory of God. ³² Give no offense either to Jews or to 20 Greeks or to the church of God; ³³ just as I also please all 21 22 men in all things, not seeking my own profit but the profit of the many, so that they may be saved. 11:1 Be imitators of 23 me, just as I also am of Christ. ² Now I praise you because 24 you remember me in everything and hold firmly to the 25 traditions, just as I delivered them to you. ³ But I want you 26 27 to understand that Christ is the head of every man, and the 28 man is the head of a woman, and God is the head of Christ. ⁴ Every man who has *something* on his head while praying 29 or prophesying disgraces his head. ⁵ But every woman who 30 31 has her head uncovered while praying or prophesying disgraces her head, for she is one and the same as the 32 33 woman whose head is shaved. ⁶ For if a woman does not 34 cover her head, let her also have her hair cut off; but if it is 35 disgraceful for a woman to have her hair cut off or her head

shaved, let her cover her head. (to be continued...)

- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?

- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?
