²⁴ So Annas sent Him bound to Caiaphas the high priest. ²⁵ Now 1 Simon Peter was standing and warming himself. So they said to him, 2 "You are not also one of His disciples, are you?" He denied it, and 3 4 said, "I am not." ²⁶ One of the slaves of the high priest, being a 5 relative of the one whose ear Peter cut off, *said, "Did I not see you in the garden with Him?" ²⁷ Peter then denied it again, and 6 immediately a rooster crowed. ²⁸ Then they *led Jesus from 7 Caiaphas into the Praetorium, and it was early; and they themselves 8 9 did not enter into the Praetorium so that they would not be defiled, 10 but might eat the Passover. ²⁹ Therefore Pilate went out to them and 11 *said, "What accusation do you bring against this Man?" ³⁰ They answered and said to him, "If this Man were not an evildoer, we 12 would not have delivered Him to you." ³¹ So Pilate said to them, 13 "Take Him yourselves, and judge Him according to your law." The 14 Jews said to him, "We are not permitted to put anyone to death," ³² to 15 fulfill the word of Jesus which He spoke, signifying by what kind of 16 death He was about to die. ³³ Therefore Pilate entered again into the 17 Praetorium, and summoned Jesus and said to Him, "Are You the 18 19 King of the Jews?" ³⁴ Jesus answered, "Are you saying this on your own initiative, or did others tell you about Me?" ³⁵ Pilate answered, 20 "I am not a Jew, am I? Your own nation and the chief priests 21 delivered You to me; what have You done?"³⁶ Jesus answered, "My 22 23 kingdom is not of this world. If My kingdom were of this world, then 24 My servants would be fighting so that I would not be handed over to the Jews; but as it is, My kingdom is not of this realm." ³⁷ Therefore 25 Pilate said to Him, "So You are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say 26 27 correctly that I am a king. For this I have been born, and for this I 28 have come into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth hears My voice." ³⁸ Pilate *said to Him, "What is truth?" 29 30 And when he had said this, he went out again to the Jews and *said to them, "I find no guilt in Him. ³⁹ But you have a custom that I 31 32 release someone for you at the Passover; do you wish then that I release for you the King of the Jews?"⁴⁰ So they cried out again, 33 saying, "Not this Man, but Barabbas." Now Barabbas was a robber. 34 35 ^{19:1} Pilate then took Jesus and scourged Him. ² And the soldiers 36 twisted together a crown of thorns and put it on His head, and put a purple robe on Him; ³ and they *began* to come up to Him and say, 37 "Hail, King of the Jews!" and to give Him slaps in the face. ⁴Pilate 38 39 came out again and *said to them, "Behold, I am bringing Him out to you so that you may know that I find no guilt in Him."⁵ Jesus then 40 came out, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. Pilate 41 42 *said to them, "Behold, the Man!"
