### Gospel According to John 19:4 - 19:22

<sup>4</sup> Pilate came out again and \*said to them, "Behold, I am bringing Him 1 2 out to you so that you may know that I find no guilt in Him." <sup>5</sup> Jesus then came out, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. *Pilate* 3 4 \*said to them, "Behold, the Man!" <sup>6</sup> So when the chief priests and the 5 officers saw Him, they cried out saying, "Crucify, crucify!" Pilate 6 \*said to them, "Take Him yourselves and crucify Him, for I find no guilt in Him." <sup>7</sup> The Jews answered him, "We have a law, and by that 7 8 law He ought to die because He made Himself out to be the Son of God." 8 Therefore when Pilate heard this statement, he was even more 9 afraid; <sup>9</sup> and he entered into the Praetorium again and \*said to Jesus, 10 "Where are You from?" But Jesus gave him no answer. 10 So Pilate 11 \*said to Him, "You do not speak to me? Do You not know that I have 12 authority to release You, and I have authority to crucify You?" 11 Jesus 13 answered, "You would have no authority over Me, unless it had been 14 given you from above; for this reason he who delivered Me to you has 15 the greater sin." <sup>12</sup> As a result of this Pilate made efforts to release 16 17 Him, but the Jews cried out saying, "If you release this Man, you are 18 no friend of Caesar; everyone who makes himself out to be a king opposes Caesar." <sup>13</sup> Therefore when Pilate heard these words, he 19 brought Jesus out, and sat down on the judgment seat at a place called 20 21 The Pavement, but in Hebrew, Gabbatha. <sup>14</sup> Now it was the day of 22 preparation for the Passover; it was about the sixth hour. And he \*said to the Jews, "Behold, your King!" 15 So they cried out, "Away with 23 24 Him, away with Him, crucify Him!" Pilate \*said to them, "Shall I 25 crucify your King?" The chief priests answered, "We have no king but Caesar." <sup>16</sup> So he then handed Him over to them to be crucified. 26 27 <sup>17</sup> They took Jesus, therefore, and He went out, bearing His own 28 cross, to the place called the Place of a Skull, which is called in Hebrew, Golgotha. <sup>18</sup> There they crucified Him, and with Him 29 two other men, one on either side, and Jesus in between. 30 <sup>19</sup> Pilate also wrote an inscription and put it on the cross. It was 31 written, "JESUS THE NAZARENE, THE KING OF THE 32 JEWS." <sup>20</sup> Therefore many of the Jews read this inscription, for 33 the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city; and it was 34 written in Hebrew, Latin and in Greek. <sup>21</sup> So the chief priests of 35 the Jews were saving to Pilate, "Do not write, 'The King of the 36 Jews'; but that He said, 'I am King of the Jews.'" <sup>22</sup> Pilate 37

answered, "What I have written I have written."

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?
