1 John 5:2 - 21

1 ² By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love 2 God and obey his commandments. ³ For this is the love of God, 3 that we keep his commandments. And his commandments are not 4 burdensome. ⁴For everyone who has been born of God overcomes 5 the world. And this is the victory that has overcome the world— 6 our faith. ⁵ Who is it that overcomes the world except the one who believes that Jesus is the Son of God? ⁶This is he who came by 7 8 water and blood—Jesus Christ; not by the water only but by the 9 water and the blood. There is sin that leads to death; I do not say that one should pray for that. ¹⁷ All 28 29 wrongdoing is sin, but there is sin that does not lead to death. 30 ¹⁸ We know that everyone who has been born of God does not keep 31 on sinning, but he who was born of God protects him, and the evil one does not touch him. 19 We know that we are from God, and 32 the whole world lies in the power of the evil one. ²⁰ And we know 33 34 that the Son of God has come and has given us understanding, so 35 that we may know him who is true; and we are in him who is true,

in his Son Jesus Christ. He is the true God and eternal life. ²¹ Little

Interpretation (What does it mean?):

- How would you title this passage?

Application (What does it mean for me?):

- What parts of this passage fit your current life situation?
- What parts seem unrelated to your circumstances?
- How might this passage affect your understanding of who God is and what He is doing?
- What part of this passage would be the most challenging for you to apply?
- What would be different (attitudes, behavior) if God used this passage to change you?

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Additional questions for thought and discussion:

- What is the connection (if any) between "his commandments are not burdensome" (v. 3) and overcoming the world (v. 4)?
- What does "overcoming the world" mean? Where do you feel you are successfully overcoming the world? And where not?
- What are "the water and the blood" John describes as witnesses? How might those witnesses relate to the controversies over the humanity and divinity of Jesus in that church?
- What is the distinction John makes about sin "leading/not leading to death" (v.16-17)?
- What do you make of John's ending to this letter? Is it an abrupt afterthought? How might it relate to the rest of the context?

Observation (What does it say?)

What <u>facts</u> do you **observe** about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?

- How are different ideas in the passage connected?
- Are there any new ideas or concepts presented?
- Are there difficulties in the passage?

Application (What does it mean for me?)

What is the <u>impact</u> on your life? What **application** does the Holy Spirit want to show you?

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to be thankful for?
- Is there an attribute of God to worship?
- Is there an example to follow?
