2 John 1:1-13

1 ¹The elder to the chosen lady and her children, whom I love 2 in truth; and not only I, but also all who know the truth, ² for the sake of the truth which abides in us and will be with us 3 4 forever: ³Grace, mercy and peace will be with us, from God the Father and from Jesus Christ, the Son of the Father, in 5 6 truth and love. ⁴I was very glad to find *some* of your 7 children walking in truth, just as we have received 8 commandment to do from the Father. 5 Now I ask you, lady, 9 not as though I were writing to you a new commandment, 10 but the one which we have had from the beginning, that we love one another. 6 And this is love, that we walk according 11 12 to His commandments. This is the commandment, just as 13 you have heard from the beginning, that you should walk in 14 it. ⁷For many deceivers have gone out into the world, those 15 who do not acknowledge Jesus Christ as coming in the 16 flesh. This is the deceiver and the antichrist. ⁸Watch 17 yourselves, that you do not lose what we have 18 accomplished, but that you may receive a full reward. 19 ⁹Anyone who goes too far and does not abide in the 20 teaching of Christ, does not have God; the one who abides 21 in the teaching, he has both the Father and the Son.¹⁰ If 22 anyone comes to you and does not bring this teaching, do 23 not receive him into your house, and do not give him a 24 greeting; ¹¹ for the one who gives him a greeting participates 25 in his evil deeds. ¹²Though I have many things to write to 26 you, I do not want to *do so* with paper and ink; but I hope to 27 come to you and speak face to face, so that your joy may be 28 made full. ¹³The children of your chosen sister greet you.

Read through the entire letter once before you start marking.

<u>Underline</u> anything that is noticeably different from John's first letter. (If you were not in our discussions about 1 John, what stands out to you in this brief letter?)

Mark with an asterisk * themes or wording you notice from John's first letter.

Circle anything that sounds like a completely new idea that was not in 1 John.

What other observations do you make?

Interpretation (What does it mean?):

How would you summarize John's purpose in writing this letter?

How do you think this letter relates to 1 John (or does it)? Before or after? To the same church or a different church? Same issues or new ones?

How might the relationship between the two letters affect your reading of both of them?

Application (What does it mean <u>for me</u>?):

- What parts of this passage fit your current life situation?
- What parts seem unrelated to your circumstances?
- What part of this passage would be the most challenging for you to apply?

Additional questions for thought and discussion:

- How does the admonition in v. 10 ("do not receive him into your house, and do not give him a greeting") apply to non-Christians, cult members, or others you encounter?
- What does John say in this letter that relates to our understanding of the relationship between the Father and the Son, i.e., the Trinity?
- "Lady" and "children" and "sister" are these individuals? Church leaders and members? The church (ekklēsia, ἐκκλησία, a feminine noun)? Who is John writing to? Is he avoiding using names (even his own) for some reason?

Observation (What does it <u>say</u>?)

What <u>facts</u> do you **observe** about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?

Inductive Bible Study

- How would the original readers have understood the passage?
- What is the main emphasis?
- Why does the writer use repetition, or contrast, or unusual words?
- What does the grammar or structure of the passage reveal about the writer's thought pattern?
- Is there a logical sequence in the passage?
- How are different ideas in the passage connected?
- Are there any new ideas or concepts presented?
- Are there difficulties in the passage?

Application (What does it mean <u>for me</u>?) What is the impact on your life?

What is the <u>impact</u> on your tife? What **application** does the Holy Spirit want to show you?

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to be thankful for?
- Is there an attribute of God to worship?
- Is there an example to follow?
