#### **Interpretation** – What does it mean?

### 1 John 1:1-5

English Standard Version

- 1 That which was from the beginning, which we have heard,
- 2 which we have seen with our eyes, which we looked upon
- 3 and have touched with our hands, concerning the word of
- 4 life—2 the life was made manifest, and we have seen it, and
- 5 testify to it and proclaim to you the eternal life, which was
- 6 with the Father and was made manifest to us—<sup>3</sup> that which
- 7 we have seen and heard we proclaim also to you, so that you
- 8 too may have fellowship with us; and indeed our fellowship is
- 9 with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. <sup>4</sup> And we are
- 10 writing these things so that our joy may be complete. <sup>5</sup> This
- 11 is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you,
- 12 that God is light, and in him is no darkness at all.

#### Observation (What does it <u>say</u>?):

Read through the passage once to start. Then:

- Circle the pronouns (we, us, our, etc.)
- *Underline the verbs (what "we" did).*
- What does the writer say about his reason for writing? What was his purpose?
- What other repeated words do you notice?

#### Interpretation (What does it mean?):

After observing the passage:

- Why do you think "we" and "us" and "our" pronouns are used so many times?
- How might the repetition of the pronouns relate to the writer's purpose?
- How is verse 5 about light related to the beginning of the passage?
- How would what the writer says be attractive to his readers (in the first century and today)?
- How would you title this passage?

### Application (What does it mean for me?):

- How would you write this passage based on your own experience with God? What would be the verbs you would use to describe that experience?
- How attractive is your testimony to others? What about your story would draw them toward Christ?

## Interpretation (What does it mean?)

What <u>questions</u> come to mind about the facts that would help you **interpret** the meaning?

- How would the original readers have understood the passage?
- What is the main emphasis?
- Why does the writer use repetition, or contrast, or unusual words?
- What does the grammar or structure of the passage reveal about the writer's thought pattern?
- Is there a logical sequence in the passage?
- How are different ideas in the passage connected?
- Are there any new ideas or concepts presented?
- Are there difficulties in the passage?

# Application (What does it mean for me?)

What is the <u>impact</u> on your life? What **application** does the Holy Spirit want to show you?

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to be thankful for?
- Is there an attribute of God to worship?
- Is there an example to follow?

## Observation (What does it say?)

What <u>facts</u> do you **observe** about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?
