1 See what kind of love the Father has given to us, that we should be called

- 2 children of God; and so we are. The reason why the world does not know
- 3 us is that it did not know him. <sup>2</sup>Beloved, we are God's children now, and
- 4 what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears
- 5 we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is. <sup>3</sup> And everyone who
- 6 thus hopes in him purifies himself as he is pure. <sup>4</sup>Everyone who makes a
- 7 practice of sinning also practices lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. <sup>5</sup> You
- 8 know that he appeared in order to take away sins, and in him there is no sin.
- 9 <sup>6</sup>No one who abides in him keeps on sinning; no one who keeps on sinning
- 10 has either seen him or known him. <sup>7</sup>Little children, let no one deceive you.
- 11 Whoever practices righteousness is righteous, as he is righteous. <sup>8</sup> Whoever
- makes a practice of sinning is of the devil, for the devil has been sinning
- 13 from the beginning. The reason the Son of God appeared was to destroy the
- 14 works of the devil. 9 No one born of God makes a practice of sinning, for
- 15 God's seed abides in him; and he cannot keep on sinning, because he has
- 16 been born of God. <sup>10</sup> By this it is evident who are the children of God, and
- who are the children of the devil: whoever does not practice righteousness
- 18 is not of God, nor is the one who does not love his brother. <sup>11</sup> For this is the
- 19 message that you have heard from the beginning, that we should love one
- 20 another. <sup>12</sup> We should not be like Cain, who was of the evil one and
- 20 another. We should not be like Cain, who was of the evil one and
- 21 murdered his brother. And why did he murder him? Because his own deeds
- were evil and his brother's righteous. <sup>13</sup> Do not be surprised, brothers, that
- 23 the world hates you. <sup>14</sup> We know that we have passed out of death into life,
- 24 because we love the brothers. Whoever does not love abides in death.
- 25 <sup>15</sup> Everyone who hates his brother is a murderer, and you know that no
- 26 murderer has eternal life abiding in him. <sup>16</sup> By this we know love, that he
- 27 laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for the
- 28 brothers. <sup>17</sup> But if anyone has the world's goods and sees his brother in
- 29 need, yet closes his heart against him, how does God's love abide in him?
- 30 <sup>18</sup> Little children, let us not love in word or talk but in deed and in truth.
- 31 <sup>19</sup> By this we shall know that we are of the truth and reassure our heart
- 32 before him; <sup>20</sup> for whenever our heart condemns us, God is greater than our
- 33 heart, and he knows everything. <sup>21</sup> Beloved, if our heart does not condemn
- 34 us, we have confidence before God; <sup>22</sup> and whatever we ask we receive
- 35 from him, because we keep his commandments and do what pleases him.
- 36 <sup>23</sup> And this is his commandment, that we believe in the name of his Son
- 37 Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us.
- 38 <sup>24</sup> Whoever keeps his commandments abides in God, and God in him. And
- 39 by this we know that he abides in us, by the Spirit whom he has given us.

- What action takes place?

- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?
