Jeremiah 2:4 – 14

- 1 ⁴Hear the word of the Lord, O house of Jacob, and all the
- 2 families of the house of Israel. ⁵ Thus says the Lord,
- 3 "What injustice did your fathers find in Me,
- 4 That they went far from Me
- 5 And walked after emptiness and became empty?

Observation (What does it say?):

What do you notice in this passage?

Begin at the end – read verse 13 first. Then read the entire passage. How does the picture of a fountain and cisterns (reservoirs) describe the problems in verses 4-12?

- Who is God's complaint against?
- What had they done or failed to do?

Interpretation (What does it mean?):

After observing the passage:

- In verse 9, what is the connection made by the "Therefore"?
- If you knew that "Kittim" was probably the island of Cyprus (far west of Israel) and Kedar was a wilderness area far east of Israel, how would that affect your understanding of verse 10?
- How would you describe the reactions in verses 11-12?
- How does verse 13 summarize the passage?
- What questions come to mind as you read?

Application (What does it mean for me?):

- What does it look like for you to "hew out" your own cisterns?
- What might be broken cisterns in your life?
- What would be an appropriate response to the problem described in verse 13?

What <u>facts</u> do you **observe** about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?

What <u>questions</u> come to mind about the facts that would help you **interpret** the meaning?

- How would the original readers have understood the passage?
- What is the main emphasis?
- Why does the writer use repetition, or contrast, or unusual words?
- What does the grammar or structure of the passage reveal about the writer's thought pattern?
- Is there a logical sequence in the passage?
- How are different ideas in the passage connected?
- Are there any new ideas or concepts presented?
- Are there difficulties in the passage?

Application (What does it mean <u>for me</u>?)

What is the <u>impact</u> on your life? What **application** does the Holy Spirit want to show you?

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to be thankful for?
- Is there an attribute of God to worship?
- Is there an example to follow?
