

Galatians 3:1 – 14

New American Standard Bible (NASB)

1 You foolish Galatians, who has bewitched you, before
2 whose eyes Jesus Christ was publicly portrayed as
3 crucified? ² This is the only thing I want to find out from
4 you: did you receive the Spirit by the works of the Law, or
5 by hearing with faith? ³ Are you so foolish? Having begun
6 by the Spirit, are you now being perfected by the flesh?
7 ⁴ Did you suffer so many things in vain—if indeed it was in
8 vain? ⁵ So then, does He who provides you with the Spirit
9 and works miracles among you, do it by the works of the
10 Law, or by hearing with faith?

11 ⁶ Even so Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to
12 him as righteousness. ⁷ Therefore, be sure that it is those
13 who are of faith who are sons of Abraham. ⁸ The
14 Scripture, foreseeing that God would justify the Gentiles
15 by faith, preached the gospel beforehand to Abraham,
16 saying, “All the nations will be blessed in you.” ⁹ So then
17 those who are of faith are blessed with Abraham, the
18 believer.

19 ¹⁰ For as many as are of the works of the Law are under a
20 curse; for it is written, “Cursed is everyone who does not
21 abide by all things written in the book of the law, to
22 perform them.” ¹¹ Now that no one is justified by the Law
23 before God is evident; for, “The righteous man shall live
24 by faith.” ¹² However, the Law is not of faith; on the
25 contrary, “He who practices them shall live by them.”

26 ¹³ Christ redeemed us from the curse of the Law, having
27 become a curse for us—for it is written, “Cursed is
28 everyone who hangs on a tree”— ¹⁴ in order that in Christ
29 Jesus the blessing of Abraham might come to the Gentiles,
30 so that we would receive the promise of the Spirit through
31 faith.

- *Draw lines connecting similar ideas in different parts of the passage.*
- *What comparisons or contrasts does he make?*
- *What else in the passage gets your attention?*

Interpretation (What does it mean?):

See suggested questions on the back.

- *How would you title each section or paragraph? Are these paragraph breaks from NASB where you would divide the passage?*
- *How do the different paragraphs relate to each other? How would you describe the flow of Paul’s thought process?*
- *What other questions come to your mind?*

Application (What does it mean for me?):

See suggested questions on the back.

- *How do you see the Spirit’s evidence of grace in your life?*
- *What would it look like for others to be blessed in you as a child of Abraham?*

Additional questions for thought and discussion:

Inductive Bible Study

Observation
(What does it say?)

What facts do you **observe** about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?

Interpretation
(What does it mean?)

What questions come to mind about the facts that would help you **interpret** the meaning?

- How would the original readers have understood the passage?
- What is the main emphasis?
- Why does the writer use repetition, or contrast, or unusual words?
- What does the grammar or structure of the passage reveal about the writer's thought pattern?
- Is there a logical sequence in the passage?
- How are different ideas in the passage connected?
- Are there any new ideas or concepts presented?
- Are there difficulties in the passage?

Application
(What does it mean for me?)

What is the impact on your life? What **application** does the Holy Spirit want to show you?

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to be thankful for?
- Is there an attribute of God to worship?
- Is there an example to follow?
