Galatians 3:23 – 4:11

 23 Now before faith came, we were held captive under the 1 law, imprisoned until the coming faith would be revealed. 2 3 ²⁴ So then, the law was our guardian until Christ came, in order that we might be justified by faith. ²⁵ But now that 4 faith has come, we are no longer under a guardian, ²⁶ for in 5 Christ Jesus you are all sons of God, through faith.²⁷ For as 6 many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on 7 Christ.²⁸ There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither 8 slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all 9 one in Christ Jesus. ²⁹ And if you are Christ's, then you are 10 Abraham's offspring, heirs according to promise. 11 ^{4:1} I mean that the heir, as long as he is a child, is no 12 different from a slave, though he is the owner of everything, 13 14 ² but he is under guardians and managers until the date set by his father. ³ In the same way we also, when we were 15 16 children, were enslaved to the elementary principles of the 17 world. ⁴ But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, ⁵ to 18 redeem those who were under the law, so that we might 19 receive adoption as sons. ⁶ And because you are sons, God 20 has sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba! 21 Father!" ⁷ So you are no longer a slave, but a son, and if a 22 23 son, then an heir through God. ⁸ Formerly, when you did not know God, you were enslaved 24 to those that by nature are not gods. ⁹ But now that you have 25 come to know God, or rather to be known by God, how can 26 27 you turn back again to the weak and worthless elementary principles of the world, whose slaves you want to be once 28 more? ¹⁰ You observe days and months and seasons and 29

30 years! ¹¹ I am afraid I may have labored over you in vain.

Observation (What does it <u>say</u>?):

What do you notice in this passage?

- Repeated words or ideas?
- Comparisons or contrasts?
- Purpose or explanation?
- Unusual or symbolic language?
- Commands or instructions?
- Conditional (if -then) statements?
- Other observations?

Interpretation (What does it <u>mean</u>?):

After observing the passage:

- What parts seem clear and straightforward?
- What parts seem unclear or confusing?
- What parts challenge your previous thinking?
- What questions come to mind as you read?
- How would you title this passage?

Application (What does it mean for me?):

- What parts of this passage fit your current life situation?
- What parts seem unrelated to your circumstances?
- How might this passage affect your understanding of who God is and what He is doing?
- What part of this passage would be the most challenging for you to apply?
- What would be different (attitudes, behavior) if God used this passage to change you?

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Additional questions for thought and discussion:

Observation (What does it say?)

What <u>facts</u> do you **observe** about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?

(A few general ideas) Interpretation

Inductive Bible Study

(What does it <u>mean</u>?)

What <u>questions</u> come to mind about the facts that would help you **interpret** the meaning?

- How would the original readers have understood the passage?
- What is the main emphasis?
- Why does the writer use repetition, or contrast, or unusual words?
- What does the grammar or structure of the passage reveal about the writer's thought pattern?
- Is there a logical sequence in the passage?
- How are different ideas in the passage connected?
- Are there any new ideas or concepts presented?
- Are there difficulties in the passage?

Application (What does it mean <u>for me</u>?)

What is the <u>impact</u> on your life? What **application** does the Holy Spirit want to show you?

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to be thankful for?
- Is there an attribute of God to worship?
- Is there an example to follow?
