- 19 another king, Jesus." 8 And the people and the city
- authorities were disturbed when they heard these things.
- 21 <sup>9</sup> And when they had taken money as security from Jason
- and the rest, they let them go.
- 10 The brothers immediately sent Paul and Silas away by
  night to Berea, and when they arrived they went into the
  Jewish synagogue. <sup>11</sup> Now these Jews were more noble than
  those in Thessalonica; they received the word with all
- 27 eagerness, examining the Scriptures daily to see if these
- 28 things were so. <sup>12</sup> Many of them therefore believed, with not
- 29 a few Greek women of high standing as well as men. <sup>13</sup> But
- 30 when the Jews from Thessalonica learned that the word of
- 31 God was proclaimed by Paul at Berea also, they came there
- 32 too, agitating and stirring up the crowds. <sup>14</sup> Then the
- 33 brothers immediately sent Paul off on his way to the sea, but
- 34 Silas and Timothy remained there. <sup>15</sup> Those who conducted
- 35 Paul brought him as far as Athens, and after receiving a
- 36 command for Silas and Timothy to come to him as soon as
- 37 possible, they departed.

What <u>facts</u> do you **observe** about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?
