- 1 Turn back, my daughters; go your way, for I am too old
- 2 to have a husband. If I should say I have hope, even if I
- 3 should have a husband this night and should bear sons,
- 4 13 would you therefore wait till they were grown? Would you

- 24 went away full, and the LORD has brought me back empty.
- 25 Why call me Naomi, when the LORD has testified against me
- 26 and the Almighty has brought calamity upon me?"
- 27 ²² So Naomi returned, and Ruth the Moabite her daughter-
- 28 in-law with her, who returned from the country of Moab. And
- 29 they came to Bethlehem at the beginning of barley harvest.

Observation (What does it say?):

Consider the observation questions on the back of this page. What do you notice in this passage?

- What reasons does Naomi give to convince Ruth to leave her?
- What promises does Ruth make to Naomi?
- What was Naomi's reception like?
- What was Naomi's response like?
- What other observations do you notice?

Interpretation (What does it mean?):

After observing the passage:

- Why might Ruth have decided to stay with Naomi when Orpah left?
- What similarities and differences do you see between Naomi's reasons to leave and Ruth's intentions to follow?
- Imagine the scene when Naomi and Ruth enter Bethlehem. What might that have been like?
- How does Naomi understand the events of her life? How does she see her part in those circumstances? How does she see God's part?
- How do the events and their effect on Naomi affect how she relates to others?
- What other questions come to mind as you read?

Application (What does it mean for me?):

- What specific events in your life had shaped your conception of God and how He is working (or if He is)?
- How do your present circumstances affect your interactions with others (friends, family, strangers)?

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Additional information for thought and discussion:

Naomi – "pleasant" (cf. Psalm 133:1 - Behold, how good and **pleasant** it is when brothers dwell in unity!)

Mara – "bitter" (cf. Exodus 15:23 - When they came to Marah, they could not drink the water of Marah because it was **bitter**; therefore it was named Marah.)

Observation (What does it <u>say</u>?)

What <u>facts</u> do you **observe** about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?

Interpretation (What does it mean?)

What <u>questions</u> come to mind about the facts that would help you **interpret** the meaning?

- How would the original readers have understood the passage?
- What is the main emphasis?
- Why does the writer use repetition, or contrast, or unusual words?
- What does the grammar or structure of the passage reveal about the writer's thought pattern?
- Is there a logical sequence in the passage?
- How are different ideas in the passage connected?
- Are there any new ideas or concepts presented?
- Are there difficulties in the passage?

Application (What does it mean for me?)

What is the <u>impact</u> on your life? What **application** does the Holy Spirit want to show you?

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to be thankful for?
- Is there an attribute of God to worship?
- Is there an example to follow?
