- 1 ¹⁶ And when she came to her mother-in-law, she said, "How
- 2 did you fare, my daughter?" Then she told her all that the man
- 3 had done for her, ¹⁷ saying, "These six measures of barley he
- 4 gave to me, for he said to me, 'You must not go back empty-
- 5 handed to your mother-in-law." ¹⁸ She replied, "Wait, my
- 6 daughter, until you learn how the matter turns out, for the man
- 7 will not rest but will settle the matter today."
- 8 4 Now Boaz had gone up to the gate and sat down there. And
- 9 behold, the redeemer, of whom Boaz had spoken, came by. So
- 10 Boaz said, "Turn aside, friend; sit down here." And he turned
- 11 aside and sat down. ² And he took ten men of the elders of the
- 12 city and said, "Sit down here." So they sat down. ³ Then he
- 13 said to the redeemer, "Naomi, who has come back from the
- 14 country of Moab, is selling the parcel of land that belonged to
- 15 our relative Elimelech. ⁴ So I thought I would tell you of it and
- 16 say, 'Buy it in the presence of those sitting here and in the
- 17 presence of the elders of my people.' If you will redeem it,
- 18 redeem it. But if you will not, tell me, that I may know, for
- 19 there is no one besides you to redeem it, and I come after
- 20 you." And he said, "I will redeem it." ⁵ Then Boaz said, "The
- 21 day you buy the field from the hand of Naomi, you also
- 22 acquire Ruth the Moabite, the widow of the dead, in order to
- 23 perpetuate the name of the dead in his inheritance." ⁶ Then the
- 24 redeemer said, "I cannot redeem it for myself, lest I impair my
- 25 own inheritance. Take my right of redemption yourself, for I
- 26 cannot redeem it."
- Now this was the custom in former times in Israel
- 28 concerning redeeming and exchanging: to confirm a
- 29 transaction, the one drew off his sandal and gave it to the
- 30 other, and this was the manner of attesting in Israel. 8 So when
- 31 the redeemer said to Boaz, "Buy it for yourself," he drew off
- 32 his sandal. ⁹ Then Boaz said to the elders and all the people,
- "You are witnesses this day that I have bought from the hand
- 34 of Naomi all that belonged to Elimelech and all that belonged
- 35 to Chilion and to Mahlon. ¹⁰ Also Ruth the Moabite, the
- 36 widow of Mahlon, I have bought to be my wife, to perpetuate
- 37 the name of the dead in his inheritance, that the name of the
- 38 dead may not be cut off from among his brothers and from the
- 39 gate of his native place. You are witnesses this day."

Interpretation (What does it mean?)

What questions come to mind about the facts that would help you **interpret** the meaning?

- How would the original readers have understood the passage?
- What is the main emphasis?
- Why does the writer use repetition, or contrast, or unusual words?
- What does the grammar or structure of the passage reveal about the writer's thought pattern?
- Is there a logical sequence in the passage?
- How are different ideas in the passage connected?
- Are there any new ideas or concepts presented?
- Are there difficulties in the passage?

Application (What does it mean for me?)

What is the impact on your life? What application does the Holy Spirit want to show you?

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to be thankful for?
- Is there an attribute of God to worship?
- Is there an example to follow?

Observation (What does it say?)

What facts do you observe about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?
